Dear Commissioner Magnus:

I write to supplement previous oversight inquiries regarding the Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) policies and procedures concerning the current border crisis. In September 2021, nearly 15,000 Haitian migrants arrived in a caravan to the Del Rio sector of the Southwest border.¹ This incredible number of migrants overwhelmed the U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) agents present in the sector, depleting supplies and negatively impacting local American communities. DHS Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas described the migrant shift to Del Rio as "unusually sudden".² In a committee briefing on September 21, 2021, United States Border Patrol Chief Raul Ortiz informed my staff that they had no prior knowledge of the 15,000-person caravan headed to the Southwest border. This assertion came as a disturbing surprise since CBP has historically tracked migrant caravans and worked in coordination with DHS Headquarters and other interagency partners to disband them prior to their arrival at a U.S. land border.³ Given the Secretary's and CBP's statements, the committee has concerns about whether CBP's Office of Intelligence has been instructed to alter their approach when gathering information about migrant caravans – a crucial part of its mission to protect the American people and safeguard our borders.

As the Ranking Member of the Subcommittee on Intelligence and Counterterrorism, I request that you preserve all documents, communications, and other records or data⁴ pertaining to the CBP Office of Intelligence's knowledge of the 15,000-person Haitian caravan arriving at the southwest border in September 2021. Specifically, please preserve any communications among the CBP Office of Intelligence, the Office of the Secretary of DHS, including the Deputy Secretary of DHS and all employees therein, and the Office of the CBP Commissioner pertaining to the CBP Office of Intelligence's information gathering and related processes in the three months prior to the caravan's arrival at the southwest border.

In ensuring compliance with this request, it is your responsibility to make sure that anyone who has contact with documents pertaining to the caravan is aware of this preservation order, and that all documents, including all markings and notes, are preserved in their initial form.⁵ Further, I request that you:

1. Exercise reasonable efforts to identify and notify former employees, contractors, subcontractors, and consultants, who have access to such electronic records that they are to be preserved;
2. Exercise reasonable efforts to identify, recover, and preserve all electronic records which have been deleted or marked for deletion but are still recoverable; and
3. If it is the routine practice of an agency employee or contractor to destroy or otherwise alter such electronic records, either halt such practices or arrange for the preservation of complete and accurate duplicates or copies of such records, suitable for production, if requested.
